

Local Galleries Bloom with Spring

Overlap Gallery has begun its second year of operation on Van Zandt Avenue with a show that creates a dialogue between two innovative artists. Francoise McAree and Taleen Batalion share the exhibition spaces with work that alternates between fabric art and prints. Their shared impulses produce abstract works that often seem mundane, but have multiple visual and sometimes metaphorical layers.

They have each mastered technique, whether dealing with cloth or other materials, and both work with a wide range. McAree, for instance, has a piece on display called "Rembrandt Carcass," featuring hand-sewn black cloth attached by rope to a painted board. In another piece, she combines wire mesh, plaster, graphite, acrylic, textile and gold leaf.

Both artists' work involves design complexity with details you might not notice at first. So, take the time and make the effort to look closely. Several of Batalion's works, both print and cloth constructions, incorporate tiny ornamental items used on dresses and gowns. These thin metal paillettes, when arranged in curved shapes, become kinetic and change as you examine them closely at different angles. First glance at all this work is insufficient; take a second, third or even fourth look to find the nuances and details you miss the first time around. It's worth it.

On April 6, at 2 p.m., Overlap will host the two artists for a workshop entitled, "Accessing Art: Making a Mind Map." The workshop will

share their preparatory process as they create their work.
